Animal Management in Rural and Remote Indigenous Communities

AMRRIC has evolved to be a knowledge broker, acting as a resource for:

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES

- To design, resource, implement, monitor and evaluate animal management programs;
- By advocating for increased resources, and better understanding and appreciation of remote community animal management needs;
- To connect with experienced veterinary service providers:
- To better promote responsible pet ownership through staff training and community education.

VETERINARY SERVICE PROVIDERS

- By providing guidelines, resources and advice on animal management history of a community, clinical considerations and approaches to community engagement;
- By linking vet service providers with beneficial local community contacts;
- By facilitating mentor/mentee relationships between experienced and newcomer veterinary providers:
- By recruiting, inducting and coordinating vet and vet nurse volunteers to add capacity to contracted veterinarians' programs and enhance program outcomes.

STAKEHOLDERS

- By providing advice on the history, context and complexities of remote community animal management programs for those who may be inexperienced;
- By catalysing relationships with, among and between stakeholders working toward similar qoals;
- By promoting evidence-informed decision making, and assisting in the collection and analysis of the data upon which these decisions are founded;
- To promote a culture of responsible animal ownership by providing veterinary and community education tools and resources to assist stakeholders as they implement animal management activities.
